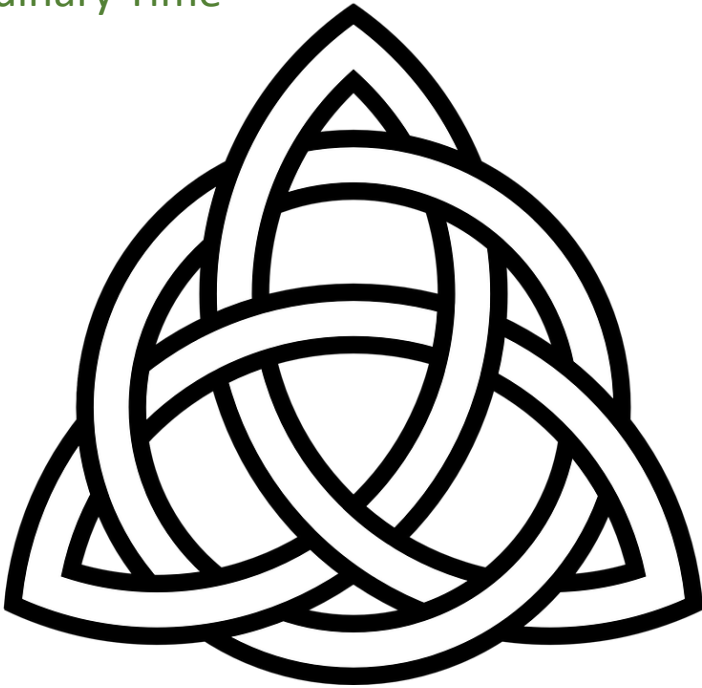

Introduction

The time known as 'Ordinary Time' when we traditionally use green vestments and hangings is a time when we are neither fasting or feasting, neither celebrating or preparing.

Whilst the use of the colour green for these periods is just a coincidence (it's between the dark purple of preparation and the bright white or gold of celebration on the colour spectrum) it has been referred to by some as the 'great green growing season' where we put into practice all that we have learned and gained from our fasting and feasting.

It also provides some much needed breathing space for us, especially in the long gap between Pentecost and Advent, where we can just simply be with God.

A Simple Order of Morning Prayer in Ordinary Time

O Lord open our lips,

*Silent prayer/reflection on the coming day. Then:
On Sundays*

the day on which the disciples
discovered the empty tomb
and met the risen Christ.

This is the day that you have made;
we rejoice and are glad in it.

Blessed be God for ever.

Or, on weekdays

Blessed are you, sovereign God, creator of all,
to you be glory and praise for ever.

You founded the earth in the beginning
and the heavens are the work of your hands.

You have made us in your image
and in these last days you have spoken to us
in your Son Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh.

Let the light of your love always shine in our
hearts,
your Spirit ever renew our lives
and your praise ever be on our lips,
Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Blessed be God for ever.

*On Sundays the Jubilate is said, on weekdays the
Venite:*

Jubilate Deo (Psalm 100)

An Order for Night Prayer (Compline)

The Lord almighty grant us a quiet night

Silent prayer/reflection on the past day.

**Lord God, we have sinned against you; we have
done what is wrong in your sight. We are sorry
and repent. In your love, have mercy on us;
cleanse us from our sin, renew a right spirit
within us and grant us the joy of your salvation,
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.**

The following hymn may be said or sung.

Before the ending of the day,
Creator of the world, we pray
That you, with steadfast love, would keep
Your watch around us while we sleep.

From evil dreams defend our sight,
From fears and terrors of the night;
Tread underfoot our deadly foe
That we no sinful thought may know.

O Father, that we ask be done
Through Jesus Christ, your only Son;
And Holy Spirit, by whose breath
Our souls are raised to life from death.

for you alone, Lord, make us dwell in safety.

Abide with us, Lord Jesus,
